9TH GRADE NATION

Core Purpose of the 9th Grade Nation:

The *9th Grade Nation* concept grew out of the work of the High School Reform Task Force and Excel. 9-12, The Plan for High School Excellence. Research of best practices and visits to high performing high schools across the country, along with the knowledge and expertise of PPS administrators, teachers, counselors and staff, led to an intense focus on the 9th grade year as extremely important for high school success. The *9th Grade Nation* is a set of strategies targeted specifically to ensure a seamless transition for students into high school as they leave 8th grade, as well as a dynamic transition during which new 9th graders become deeply engrossed with their learning and wholeheartedly immersed in what they themselves can achieve and contribute.

Students "make new history" by connecting themselves to the history and greatness within the City of Pittsburgh and simultaneously reaching for new and limitless possibilities guided by their own creativity and ingenuity.

Mission of the 9th Grade Nation

Our students must take ownership for their learning, achieve high academic standards, and graduate with a plan for the future. We want them to develop strong and respectful relationships with adults and peers and to understand and value how as individuals they are interconnected with, and valued by, all of us in Pittsburgh Public Schools and the

Pittsburgh Community as a whole. We want them to be the change they wish to see in the world. In turn, we must be the change they wish to see in us.

9th Grade Nation – Student Outcome Goals

All 9th Grade Nation students will:

- Be known, valued and inspired;
- Attend, adjust and achieve in an environment of high expectations and standards for all students;
- Have at least one involved caring adult who knows them well;
- Be assessed and provided early interventions to meet individual needs;
- Be connected to the school and community through extra curricular activities and service learning projects;
- Understand and experience their civic role and responsibility and how they can be the change;
- Be promoted academically on to the 10th grade.

Early Dismissal

Any student requesting an early dismissal should present a written request to the office after reporting to homeroom. The request should include the student's name, homeroom, date, time, reason for early dismissal, a parent or guardian's signature and a telephone number at which the parent may be reached. At the time designated, the parent must report to the main office to complete the sign out process.

The student will be expected to report to the office at the requested time. No student will be dismissed to anyone other than his/her legal guardian, unless a written request is submitted by said guardian and approved by the administration.

Tardiness

Excessive tardiness to homeroom or any class will result in disciplinary action. In the case where a school bus is late, the student is marked as a "bus tardy," and this does not count against the student's accumulation of tardies.

Emergency School Closing

Should any emergency arise or serious weather conditions make roadways impassable, notice of school closings or delays will be broadcast over the radio and television stations starting at 6 a.m.

Emergency Announcements/Calls

Emergency announcements concerning changes in planned activities (due to inclement weather or other unusual circumstances) will be broadcasted to students and staff as necessary.

Students will only be given emergency messages from home. Telephones are not available for student use. Daily announcements involving student activities are announced at the beginning and end of each school day.

Leaving the Building

While school is in session (includes after-school activities), students are not permitted to leave the school grounds unless authorized to do so by one of the building administrators. This offense may warrant suspension.

Medication

Any medication to be taken by a student during school hours must be brought to the office immediately upon the student's arrival at school. Medication will be dispensed in accordance with the district guidelines identified below:

- Most medications (prescription and non-prescription) shall be administered in school only on a written order of a family physician and a written request from parent/guardian.
- Rescue medications that have been specifically permitted by School Health Services to be in the possession of the child must be registered in the office. The school nurse practitioner will see to training the child, informing the staff and monitoring the use of these medications.
- All medications will be dispensed under the supervision of the school nurse practitioner.
- All medications must be in the original pharmacy container(s).

Property

School Property: Students are held responsible for the proper care and use of all books, supplies, combination locks, apparatus or equipment furnished by the school. Students who damage school property will be required to pay for repairs and/or replacement.

Personal Property: Students are advised against bringing large sums of money or items of considerable value to school. The school cannot assume the responsibility for the loss or theft of personal property.

Withdrawal of Students

The Guidance Counselor should be notified at least one week in advance of a student's impending withdrawal. The student will receive a withdrawal form and instructions from the Guidance Department. All textbooks, library books, lunch payments, and fines must be cleared before the student secures a transfer record to another school.

School Visitors

The administration and faculty cordially invite parents, members of the community and interested educators to visit the school.

Appropriate guidelines and procedures have been established to greet and welcome visitors, to foster an understanding of education in our school and to exercise reasonable control over the frequency and number of visitations so that the educational program is not disrupted. The administration reserves the right to refuse school visitors, to limit their visit and/or have visitors removed from the school.

Visitors are required to report to the office and secure a visitors permit that will indicate that the bearer is an approved visitor. The permit should be returned at the conclusion of the visit.

Volunteer Services

We encourage parents to take an active role at Pittsburgh Milliones by volunteering their services and expertise. All volunteers must receive the Act 34 and 151 clearances. Wide and diverse ranges of opportunities are available for interested parents. We welcome all parents on a regular, as well as occasional basis, to assist in the daily programming.

Emergency Drills

The purpose of evacuation drills is to give practice in quiet, orderly and rapid departure from the building. Knowing the location of the emergency exit for each of your classes will enable you, the student, to make a safe exit in all situations.

- Maintain silence at all times.
- When making your exit, keep in single file unless otherwise directed.
- Everyone must leave the building and be accounted for during roll check.

- Recall will be sounded when conditions are suitable.
- Remain with your class and respond quickly to the direction of your teacher.

School Services

Pupil Personnel Services at Pittsburgh Milliones are designed to help students live rich, full lives: intellectually, emotionally, socially, and morally.

The plan and purpose of all pupil personnel services is to assist the student and to understand himself/herself; to help in the relief of tension and anxieties; and to remove distractions to learning. Pupil personnel services are developed and implemented by a team of competent professionals. Included are homeroom teachers, team leaders, guidance counselors, school and district administrators and medical personnel retained by the school district.

ACADEMICS

Homework

Students are responsible for completing all work assigned in a timely manner. This independent practice serves as a strong foundation for academic success. Tutoring sessions provided by the University of Pittsburgh's Center for Urban Education occur at the school every week (Mon-Fri) from 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the University of Florida room. Faculty and staff will provide tutoring progress updates to parents via e-mail. Students are expected to record homework in the agenda book daily and complete it as assigned. Parents and students alike will benefit by reviewing the agenda books and the completed work on an ongoing basis.

Late Work

The purpose of homework is to help the students to learn. Students need to view homework as a study tool that helps them to practice what is learned in the classroom. It serves as a vital supplement to the lesson. Without it, the learning that is done in the classroom is superficial because it is not reinforced or practiced. The effect of homework is most beneficial when it is completed in conjunction with the lesson.

- Teachers expect that all assigned work will be turned in on time.
- The students are responsible for listing the homework assignments in the agenda book and for showing written notes to their parents and to the teacher.

College Tours and Visitations Program

The purpose of the annual college tours and visitation program is to provide Pittsburgh Milliones students with exposure to university life. Visits include meetings with college students and admissions representatives. Students learn what questions they should be asking of campus officials, how to compare schools to one another, and what factors are most important for their personal college selection process. Grades 6-8 will enjoy local college tours and visits, while grades 9-10 will visit out-of-state colleges and universities.

Academic Development

All students at Pittsburgh Milliones will have personal education plans which will focus on student matriculation throughout their 6-12 experience.

The wage is traditionally \$5.50 / hour. Generally, 50% of the wage would be paid by the service provider, and 50% by the employer [although other arrangements may be considered on a case by case basis], and there should be a strong employer commitment to hire upon internship completion).
