## SCHOOL PROCEDURES

### Bell Schedule

The school day begins at 7:45 AM and ends at 3:00 PM for teachers and students, and is comprised of a 9-period day made up of eight (8) 45-minute classes and one (1) 35-minute lunch period. For further details, check our web site at [www.pps.k12.pa.us/schenley](http://www.pps.k12.pa.us/schenley).

## Student Responsibilities

- During the school day, you are responsible for acting in a way that will help you do your best and allow others to do their best. Use common sense and good manners to create a pleasant school environment. Make every effort to pay attention and complete all assignments.

- All students are expected to arrive at school and at all classes on time. Students have four minutes between classes. You will be prepared for your classes every day by being on time with completed homework, a pencil or pen, notebook and textbook. Demonstrate respect for others and for your school materials.
- During class time students are not permitted to be in the halls without an authorized hall pass. Hall passes are intended for emergency use only. A completed hall pass must contain the student's name, teacher's name, time of departure and destination. Students found in the hall without a valid pass will be subject to disciplinary action.
- Once you arrive at school, you are not permitted to leave the building until the end of the school day unless you are participating in an organized program supervised by a staff member outside of school, or you are officially dismissed by the school. If you leave the building unauthorized, you may be picked up by the Mobile Unit, taken to the Truancy Center and will be suspended for one day.

## **Attendance**

Regular attendance in school is essential to your success.

Absences include both absences from school and the cutting of individual classes. Attendance standards include both legal and illegal absences. Students with more than six illegal absences will receive a failing grade for the report period and will not be permitted to make up assignments. Students entering school after 10:00 a.m. must be accompanied by a parent/guardian or have a note from a medical or legal office.

Upon returning to school, it is your responsibility to contact teachers and complete any missed assignments. If you are going to be absent for an extended period, you need to contact the intervention specialist to make the necessary arrangements.

## **Bus Passes**

The Board of Education, Pittsburgh Public Schools, Office of Transportation is responsible for determining which Pittsburgh Schenley students are eligible to receive a monthly bus pass from the Port Authority of Allegheny County. Those students who are enrolled at Pittsburgh Schenley and live outside of a two mile radius from the school are eligible to receive a monthly bus pass from the Board Of

Education. Students who do not attend their school of residence and are out of their feeder pattern because of parent choice or open enrollment are not eligible to receive bus passes.

## **Distribution**

Bus passes are distributed during the last week of the month. The homeroom teacher distributes a bus pass to the assigned student. The student will then sign for his/her bus pass and record the number next to his/her name on the roster. Students who are absent from homeroom on the day of distribution will have to see the transportation administrator for their bus pass upon returning to school.

## **Lost or Stolen**

Neither Pittsburgh Schenley nor the Board Of Education is responsible for any bus pass that is lost or stolen. Parents are responsible for their child's transportation until the next date bus passes are distributed through Pittsburgh Schenley. Parents may call Pittsburgh Schenley 412.665.2260 or the Board's Office of Transportation 412.338.8125 for assistance.

## **Early Dismissals**

Early dismissals will be granted for justifiable reasons approved by school authorities. If you need an early dismissal, you must submit a note written by your parent/guardian to the main office by 10 a.m. on the day of the request. Students must see their assistant principal for any requests received after 10 a.m. The note must include: student's full name and homeroom; reason for the request and time of dismissal; phone number where a parent can be reached during the day; and your parent's signature. Early dismissals will not be granted unless your parent/guardian can be reached before the designated dismissal time. We are not permitted to dismiss students if we do not reach an adult. Please do not call the school to have your child dismissed; we are not permitted for safety reasons to dismiss a student in this manner.

If the early dismissal is approved, students may pick up their early dismissal slip after period 2 or between any periods thereafter. You must present the early dismissal slip to the subject teacher at the appropriate time, report directly to the main office, sign the early dismissal book, and leave the building. In the event of an emergency, your parent/ guardian may pick you up in person. Proper picture ID must be presented.

## **Closing School during Emergencies**

Sometimes it is necessary to close school when such conditions as extreme weather emergencies make it impossible to stay open. Should the weather look so bad that you suspect school might be closed, please do not call the school. Announcements will be made on local radio and TV stations.

On days when the weather becomes hazardous after the students have arrived at school, we rarely have an “announced official” early dismissal; if the situation warrants it, students may be dismissed.

## **Religious Observance**

Students will be excused for religious observation upon written request of a parent.

## **School Dress Code**

The Board Of Education adopted a policy regarding dress codes in 1991 for all students attending the Pittsburgh Public Schools. Every school must adhere to the exclusionary dress code which prohibits students from wearing articles of clothing or jewelry that by words, signs, pictures or any combination thereof, appearing on said clothing or jewelry, describe community location (section of city), community group, gang or affiliation, or advocates or promotes the use of alcohol or drugs, violence, race discrimination, or sexual activity. This prohibition shall be in effect during regular school hours and any school-sponsored event whether on or off school premises.

A Pittsburgh Schenley High School committee composed of students and staff members adopted dress code guidelines. The purpose of the dress code is to enhance the health and safety of all students and to avoid distractions in the classrooms or to cause an interference with school work. We encourage students to dress in an appropriate manner. In regard to inappropriate dress:

- Shorts and skirts must be longer than the length of the student’s arm when standing erect.
- No spandex is permitted.
- No halter tops or tank tops without a t-shirt as the under garment.
- No undershirts without an appropriate outer garment.
- No mini-skirts. Leggings must be worn with an overlay to the fingertips.
- No head gear, i.e. hats, caps, wave caps or women’s scarves, are to be worn in the building

- No clothing with suggestive/abusive message.
- No plunging necklines or tops that reveal cleavage.
- No tops that do not fully cover the midriff (area between the chest and waist).
- No sweaters as dresses.

Any inappropriately dressed student will be asked to remove the item(s) and/or sent home to change and return properly dressed. Should a student defy the dress code and refuse to comply, disciplinary measures will be taken.

Remember, Pittsburgh Schenley is a formalized educational setting. Our expectation is that both students and staff dress appropriately for the image we want to present to the community.

## **Graduation**

Graduation is held annually at the Mellon Arena. Attire is formal: boys should wear shirts and ties with dress pants and dress shoes; no sneakers or Timberlands should be worn. Girls should wear a dress, skirt or dress pants with dress shoes. If inappropriate attire is worn, the student will not be permitted to walk.

## **Prom**

The Pittsburgh Schenley prom is held off-campus. Although the prom is not held on school property, all school rules still apply. Anyone not wearing proper attire (i.e. too revealing, too short) will not be permitted entry to the prom. Fighting, drinking and/or drug use will result in harsh disciplinary action from the school as well as an arrest by the Pittsburgh Police.

## **School Security**

The Pittsburgh Schenley High School security staff includes three security officers. Their responsibility is to help us maintain a safe school. School security personnel are available all day to help maintain an appropriate learning environment. The security office is located on the first floor.

## **Metal detectors**

For the safety of all students and staff, metal detectors are located at the main and side entrances. All students, parents and visitors must pass through metal detectors upon entering Pittsburgh Schenley.

## Fire Drills

Fire drills are held monthly throughout the school year. Directions for leaving the building via the nearest exit are posted in each room. When the fire alarm sounds, you are to evacuate the building quickly and quietly at the direction of the teacher. Once outside the building, please move away from it and line up on the sidewalk. Your safety is our priority.

## Daily Bulletin

A bulletin is issued every day and is available in each homeroom. Since the bulletin will be read during homeroom only, please listen carefully as important information necessary for you to participate in school activities is being delivered.

## Class Interruptions

The time spent by students on educational tasks is essential for success and a major factor for improving achievement. It is the policy of Pittsburgh Schenley High School to keep classroom interruptions to a minimum. Announcements, calling students from class and other interruptions are only permitted during the last 3 minutes of class periods.

## Library

The Pittsburgh Schenley High School library is located on the second floor, just above the main school entrance. The library opens each day at 7:20 a.m.

The library is an essential part of the instructional program at Pittsburgh Schenley, serving the school community by promoting reading for pleasure, providing access to research materials, both print and non-print, and assisting students to develop skills to help them become lifelong learners and effective users of information.

The library collection consists of approximately 13,000 books as well as newspapers, magazines and 20 student computers with Internet access and online resources. Through Access Pennsylvania, the library provides access to the collections of 2,948 Pennsylvania libraries with holdings of 13 million titles and 61 million items. P.O.W.E.R. Library (Pennsylvania Online World of Electronic Resources) allows students use of thousands of full-text periodical articles, newspapers, a major encyclopedia, plus photographs, pictures, charts, maps and reference materials.

Students may use the library on an individual basis:

- before school
- during school, with a pass from assigned teacher
- during lunch, with a pass obtained in the library before school

Please note: if a class is being held in the library, passes may be suspended for that period.

Books are checked out for a loan period of two weeks and may be renewed if another student is not waiting for the material. Reference materials and magazines do not circulate. It is expected that books be returned on time. Fines for overdue books are five cents per book, per day. Students having overdue materials or owing a fine of more than \$1 are not allowed to circulate additional materials.

All library obligations must be met before graduation.

## Cafeteria

The cafeteria is located on the first floor. Lunch and breakfast are served daily. You will report to the cafeteria only during your assigned lunch period. During this time you will have access to your locker. There are certain routines we all must follow in order to maintain a safe and clean cafeteria:

- Be courteous.
- Wait your turn in line.
- Leave your table clean; throw away your tray, etc.
- Deposit waste in containers.
- Refrain from boisterous, dangerous or disruptive antics. Students need to be seated.
- Vending machines are available during the lunch periods.
- No food may be eaten or taken beyond the ends of the corridor between the two cafeteria seating areas. This includes food brought from home, purchased in the cafeteria or dispensed from the vending machines.

## Computer Labs

The use of electronic resources is supported provided that abuses do not occur. Access is a privilege that will be denied if used inappropriately. In addition, disciplinary and/or legal action may be taken. When using Pittsburgh Schenley's computer labs, students may not:

- Use the computers for illegal activities.
- Use the computers for financial gain.
- Use the computers for non-school or work-related activities.
- Use the computers to send hate mail or to produce material which discriminates against others.
- Use foul, obscene, or vulgar language on the computers.
- Use computers to plagiarize, defraud or deceive.
- Use the computers to change anyone else's account, password or class work.
- Use the computers to pose as persons other than themselves.
- Use the computers to look at obscene, vulgar, lewd or discriminatory material.
- Use the computers to copy disks, CDs or programs that have copyrights.
- Use the computers to load programs, games or disks from home.
- Use the computers to disrupt the work of other students.
- Destroy or remove any computer software or hardware.

### **Consequences for Misuse of Computers**

Students who break the above rules:

- Will lose computer privileges.
- Will be provided with a written assignment to replace the computer assignment.
- Will be reported to the appropriate administrator who will notify the students' parents/guardians about the offense and the suspension of computer privileges.

### **Lockers**

All students involved in after-school activities are expected to go to their lockers immediately after school. Teachers are not to excuse students to go to their lockers during regular school hours.

Your homeroom teacher will assign a locker for your individual use for storage of books, clothing and personal belongings. Obtain a strong lock and keep the combination or key secure. You must use the locker assigned to you by your homeroom teacher. Do not change lockers or attempt to open a locker that does not belong to you. The school is not

responsible for stolen property. Incidents of theft or loss should be reported to the security office. Do not bring valuable items to school.

Although each student is responsible for locking the assigned locker, all lockers are and shall remain the property of the school. The student's use of a locker does not diminish the school's ownership or control of the locker. The school reserves the right to open and inspect any locker and its contents. This is necessary to ensure that the lockers are being used in accordance with intended purpose and to eliminate fire or other hazards, maintain sanitary conditions and attempt to locate lost or stolen materials.

### **Lost And Found/ Bookroom**

The school is not responsible for any personal losses but we will make every effort to help find the missing items. We encourage students to lock all personal belongings in their assigned locker.

The bookroom is also the place where students pay for missing books. If you are seeking a lost book, inquire at the bookroom with your book number. When the books are found and returned to school, payment is refunded. If you find any items during the school day, take them to the bookroom.

### **Hall Passes**

You are not permitted in the hall without a hall pass signed by a teacher. Instructional time is extremely valuable; therefore, hall passes are to be used only for emergencies. Students without a hall pass will be assumed to be cutting class and be subject to disciplinary action.

### **Schedule**

The schedule you receive on the first day of school is your schedule for the first semester. Your schedule for the second semester will be issued on the first day of the new semester at mid-term. Schedule changes will not be made except when your academic advisor determines that a change is necessary to meet academic requirements. For the first semester, all schedule changes after September 30th must be approved by the principal. For the second semester all schedule changes after February 10th must be approved by the principal.

### **Final Exams**

Final exams are given at the end of each semester in all classes. As a school policy, students must take the semester and final exams on the published dates. In order to ensure academic success, continual preparation, review and study are necessary in all

classes. Students are expected to come to class on time and to stay in class for the entire period. No dismissals for any reasons during finals.

### **Senior Fees**

Senior fees must be paid in full prior to graduation. These fees are adjusted each school year.

### **Telephone Usage**

Use of cell phones is not permitted in school. In emergencies, students may use the phone in the main office with permission from a school administrator. Parents, please do not call for students or ask them to call home before 2:45 p.m. Students cannot be called out of classes and personal messages cannot be delivered to them.

### **Electronic devices**

A student shall not possess any paging device, radio, CD, laser pointer or related electronic equipment or other telecommunication device on school grounds, at school-sponsored activities or on buses or other vehicles provided by the school district. Students shall not use cell phones in school buildings or on school grounds during school hours. Students found to be in violation of this rule will be subject to disciplinary action and confiscation of the device.

### **Textbooks/Supplies**

Students are responsible for the textbooks and supplies provided by the school. Students will be responsible for payment of lost or damaged books and school-issued supplies. Seniors must pay all delinquent accounts in full before a diploma will be issued.

### **Tutoring**

Pittsburgh Schenley offers in-school tutoring sponsored by our students and teachers on a volunteer basis. The schedule for the in-school tutoring program is available in the counselors office. It is the responsibility of the student to contact the teacher, schedule an appointment and go to tutoring programs for remediation or academic enhancement as soon as they are available.

## **PUPIL SERVICES**

### **Health Services**

The school nurse practitioner is a Licensed Professional Nurse and a Certified School Nurse. Her responsibilities include:

- Providing health appraisals and screening tests including height and weight measurement, vision tests, audiometric test, and scoliosis screening.
- Offering health counseling.
- Referring to school or community resources.
- Managing illness and medical emergencies.
- Managing the school environment by modifying the student's environment to accommodate handicaps or special needs.

It is mandatory that all parents of students who are new to the Pittsburgh Public Schools have a copy of their child's immunization record presented to the school nurse practitioner on the first day of enrollment. Any questions concerning your health should be referred to the nurse practitioner.

### **Pittsburgh Schenley Wellness Center**

Through an innovative partnership with the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center's Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic and The Pittsburgh Board Of Education, Pittsburgh Schenley High School and Children's Hospital Of Pittsburgh have created the Adolescent Health Center at Pittsburgh Schenley.

A healthcare team, as well as professionals from Children's Hospital's Adolescent Medicine Program, provides care at the center. Students with parental consent can receive physical exams, immunizations, treatment of acute illness and injuries, and mental health evaluations. The Pittsburgh Schenley Wellness Center promotes healthy decision-making and communication between teens and their families.

### **Guidance Services**

The Counseling Office/Guidance Department is open to all students before and after school, and at all other times to students who have proper authorization to be out of class. All students are seen by their academic counselor several times a year for scheduling conferences. Parent participation is invited and encouraged at all times.

The goal of guidance services is to help each student realize his/her full potential as a unique person and to assist the student to understand himself/herself so that the student can make wise, independent decisions. See your counselor if you need:

- answers to questions about your class schedule.
- clarification about all the options, programs and services offered at Pittsburgh Schenley.

- to talk about your education or career plans.
- to talk to an understanding person who keeps things confidential.
- information about colleges/universities, loans and scholarships.
- information about vocational schools.
- information about military service.
- information about part-time or summer jobs.

### **Intervention Specialist**

The Intervention Specialist at Pittsburgh Schenley works intensively on a one-to-one or group basis with those students who have been unable to function effectively in school programs, and deals immediately with individual student problems of crisis nature in a constructive, supportive and non-judgmental manner.

### **ACTIVITIES**

#### **Sports**

Any Pittsburgh Schenley High School student who has an interest in sports may participate in our sports program. To be eligible to participate, the following is required:

- A physician must certify that the student is able to take part in the chosen sport before the first practice begins.
- The parent must sign a permission slip.
- Students must maintain a "C" or better average grade in all subjects.

In most sports, no previous skill level is necessary to join a team. Sports practice and competitions take place after school hours.

#### **Student Government**

Student government is composed of the elected freshmen, sophomore, junior and senior officers, homeroom representatives, and student government officers. Each homeroom elects a representative and an alternate to attend these meetings. This important organization serves to promote student participation in the policy-making decisions within the school as well as to direct students' social and community projects.

### **National Honor Society**

Pittsburgh Schenley High School is pleased to offer membership in the National Honor Society to those students who:

- Maintain a 3.30 quality point average (QPA) throughout their tenure at Pittsburgh Schenley.
- Are involved in community activities.
- Have a staff recommendation to join the National Honor Society.
- Have not received any unsatisfactory (U) marks in citizenship.

Induction into the National Honor Society may occur in the 11th grade, but the candidate must have earned the 3.30 quality point average (QPA) in the 9th and 10th grades to qualify. If, for any reason, a member of the Society drops below the 3.30 QPA, the member will have only one semester to bring up the quality point average.

### **PROGRAMS**

#### **Magnet Information Overview**

Magnet programs provide opportunities to achieve racial balance through voluntary enrollment and allow students to pursue special interests, talents or career goals. Students who enroll in a magnet program are expected to remain in the program for at least one school year and must maintain satisfactory attendance, citizenship and academic progress or the transfer may be rescinded and the student may be returned to the school of assignment.

#### **Center for Advanced Studies (CAS)**

Pittsburgh Schenley has the second largest gifted program in the city of Pittsburgh. A student's eligibility in the CAS program is based on analysis of his/her performance and ability. A minimum of 3.0 GPA and stanines of 7-8-9 on the California Achievement Test are needed for the student to be considered. In addition, with a score of 130 or higher on an approved IQ test, the student may be scheduled for classes as well as receive support services from the CAS facilitator and the teaching staff. Participation is subject to rules governing magnet programs.

CAS offers accelerated in-depth learning for gifted students, a smaller student-teacher ratio and an emphasis on critical thinking. Teacher mentors are assigned to each student, and enrichment activities are organized by the CAS facilitators. Student progress is monitored and an individual education

program (IEP) is designed with the student's strengths and interests in mind.

At least eight of the 22 units for graduation must be earned in CAS or IB academic subjects and the annual CAS long-term projects (LTPS) must be completed for a student to receive a CAS certificate with his/her diploma. An additional .50 quality point per semester is awarded for the successful completion of each CAS or IB class. This extra weight is significant as an indicator to colleges of advanced work.

### **International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP)**

International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme has a rigorous and cohesive advanced placement curriculum for academically successful and highly motivated 11th and 12th grade students who wish to pursue the International Baccalaureate Diploma, an internationally acclaimed degree, which is awarded to students who have completed specific courses and passed examinations. Foundation courses for the IBDP are offered in the 9th and 10th grade through the Middle Years Programme (MYP), and the CAS program at Pittsburgh Schenley.

Students formally enter the Diploma Programme in the 11th grade. Academic courses in the Diploma Programme can be counted towards the eight CAS courses needed to earn a CAS designation on the high school diploma. The IBDP classes are weighted .50 additional quality points per semester in determining the student's GPA. It is recommended that a student who participates in the Diploma Programme maintain a "B" average or higher. All students who participate in the Diploma Programme are better prepared to enter post-secondary education. The IBDP courses are recognized for their rigor; therefore, their inclusion on a student's transcript can be beneficial in his/her evaluation by college admission officers. The greatest value, however, lies in the program's intrinsic worth as a challenge and a symbol of the greater achievement to which students and teachers aspire.

### **International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (MYP)**

After formal acceptance into the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (MYP) magnet at Pittsburgh Schenley, students work toward fluency in at least one foreign language, and are required to take four of the same foreign language and four years of social studies. All courses are at scholars' level and are taught from a global perspective. MYP students are encouraged to "think globally" and are offered numerous opportunities to participate in symposia, seminars, and field trips,

which provide them with international perspectives on a variety of issues.

After successful completion of the MYP curriculum in the 9th and 10th grades, students are expected to enroll in the IBDP courses for the 11th and 12th grade subjects. Students may take a combination of MYP and CAS courses if they so desire. MYP students who also are CAS students may take a maximum of two CAS classes (four, if one is mathematics) during each of their ninth and tenth grades if they meet the qualifications.

Since MYP courses earn scholar's credit, including the extra .25 quality point per semester, each successfully completed course can be beneficial in determining the final quality point average (QPA). Continuation in the MYP requires that a student maintains a QPA of 2.0 for the entire four years. If a student does not pass the first semester with at least a 2.0 QPA, the student will be placed on probation for the second semester. If satisfactory progress is not made during the second semester, the student will be removed from the program.

### **Pittsburgh Scholars Program (PSP)**

The Pittsburgh Scholars Program (PSP) offers a five-year (8th-12th) sequential curriculum for an in-depth study of English, social studies, mathematics, science, and world language. Although criteria for candidates of the PSP are listed separately and will be looked at separately, it is the aggregate of criteria that should qualify a student for invitation to the program. No single criteria operating alone should either qualify or disqualify a candidate.

The following are criteria for students who wish to participate in the PSP:

- Teacher recommendation
- Past performance as exhibited by above average grades (A or B) in the subject area(s) being considered.
- Parent consultation
- Scores of 7-8-9 stanines in reading or math
- Academic counselor recommendation

Please note that the IQ is not the criterion for the selection of candidates. Nomination by teacher and parents is encouraged. The overall demands of this program will be discussed with parents and students so that they understand its challenging nature in terms of time and effort.

## Robotics Technology Studies

The Robotics Technology Studies Magnet is a successful blend of technological and academic curricula which focuses on the electronic composition, function and application of computer and robotic technologies. Students enrolled in the Robotics Technology Studies Magnet take core Academic courses at Reizenstein and take Robotics classes at Pittsburgh Peabody. A curriculum of four years of electronics (including solid state circuitry, AF and RF communications, and digital logic), computer applications, technical drawing and computer aided drafting (CAD), technical writing and robotics is combined with required courses in English, mathematics, science, social studies, physical education and health to give the student necessary credits for graduation. Foreign language, advanced math, sciences courses, and other electives are offered to prepare for a successful transition to post-secondary education. All academic subjects are available to qualified Technological Studies students at a gifted (CAS) or scholars (PSP) level.

Through corporate Partnerships-in-Education with Duquesne Light Company and Pittsburgh Technology Council, a variety of enrichment activities are conducted annually. These activities include the Student Technology Conference, Junior Engineering and Technical Society (JETS) competition, Invention/ New Product Expo, field trips to Carnegie Science Center, Job Fairs and tours sponsored by technical schools and shadowing experiences.

## Program for Students with Exceptionalities

The Special Education Department provides educational programs for special needs students in the Center for Advanced Studies (CAS); Learning Support (LS) and specialized academic, vocational and life skills readiness instruction. The goal is to assist these students to become productive members of society and enhance their self-esteem. For this purpose, an individualized educational plan (IEP) is developed for each special education student. The IEP is a state-mandated, legally binding document that affirms the state's commitment to educating the student with special disabilities and with special abilities (the gifted). It delineates the yearly academic and personal goals recommended by the school's special education team for each special education student. Those recommendations are based on the student's level of achievement and are to be implemented throughout the academic year.

## Code of student Conduct

Briefly, respect yourself and others. Any behavior that disrupts the learning process or violates school regulations will not be tolerated. The following types of behavior will result in disciplinary action:

- Disruption of school
- School property-damage, destruction or theft
- Private property-damage, destruction or theft
- Assault-school employee—simple assault
- Assault-school employee—aggravated assault
- Assault-student or other person not employed—simple assault
- Assault-student or other person not employed—aggravated assault
- Weapons and other dangerous instruments
- Narcotics, marijuana, stimulant drugs and alcoholic beverages
- Disorderly conduct
- Unauthorized presence
- Tobacco use
- Telecommunication devices: parents should retrieve confiscated devices from the main office.
- Academic dishonesty
- Sexual harassment
- Misuse of computer/networks
- Undesirable group activity
- Fighting
- Bullying

Violation of any of the above rules results in the following discipline action depending on the severity of the violation.

- Saturday Options Center
- Suspension
- Expulsion/transfer

Remember: all students are expected to follow the rules and regulations of the Board Of Education, the school administrators, individual teachers and other staff. Violations of any of the above can result in school discipline and/or charges at the local magistrate or juvenile court. Students are required to be courteous, polite and contribute to a good school climate.

## Saturday Detention Center

Depending on the severity of the violation of the code of student conduct, students may be assigned to the Saturday Detention Center. Students may report to the center between 8:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. at Southside Transition Center. Students are expected to bring school work with them and stay the entire assigned hour(s). If a student chooses not to attend the Saturday Detention Center, the student will be suspended the following Tuesday.
